



Post 18 Destinations.

Year 13 Geography Lecture.

Our Geographers attended a lecture at University of Nottingham recently where they learned about The League of Nations. The League of Nations was the world's first great experiment in global governance. After the First World War, the League promised a more equitable world order, but its noble ideals masked deep divisions over the issue of racial equality. The lessons of these years profoundly shaped the creation of the League's successor, the United Nations, in 1945. The talk, aligned with the curriculum's global systems and governance focus, is part of Black History Month and accompanied by an exhibition.



Year 12 Trip to Experian.

Fifteen Business Studies students went on a trip to the Experian Offices in Nottingham. The students learnt how to work out their credit score, what they can do to improve their score and why it is important to have a high score. Students also met with an Experian apprentice who joined instead of going to University and is now studying at degree level with them. We also heard how well two of our former students are doing with Experian working in Procurement and the Legal Department at Experian. Both students left us at the end of Year 13. Experian offer Level 3-7 apprenticeships every year.

We also heard about the stages of the application process and students were given advice on how to be successful throughout the process. Experian very much value the wellbeing of their staff with flexible working, working from home, breakout rooms for meetings, comfortable work areas, a lovely restaurant, pool tables and a garden and bee hives outdoors. We enjoyed the tour of the offices and many students were inspired to work there!

Student Union.

This half term the SU have been busy with events. Firstly, the SU observed suicide prevention month in September with an informative PowerPoint, which focused on the warning signs for suicide and what people can do to prevent it.

Next came October, which brought with it a multitude of events. We celebrated Black History Month, where some of our sixth form history students engaged with lower school putting on assemblies and raised awareness of black voices throughout history that have been marginalised.

Furthermore, on the 10th of October, we organised hello yellow day, where students were encouraged to wear yellow clothes and donate to young minds, a charity which raises awareness and helps young people who are struggling with their mental health. We helped to raise awareness about mental health through a PowerPoint and we encouraged students to write affirmations for themselves and others on sunflowers which are displayed in the atrium. For hello yellow, we managed to raise in total £73.16, which has gone to a great cause.

Finally, last week, on the 20th of October we raised awareness of breast cancer on Wear It Pink day. We yet again encouraged students to adorn themselves in another colour – this time pink – to raise awareness for the incredible charity Breast Cancer Now, which raises awareness of breast cancer and helps those impacted by this cruel disease. The SU created a PowerPoint, which gave lots of important information about the disease and showed students how to check themselves for lumps along with advertising many of the other events we're running.

On Friday, the SU put on a bake sale, thanks to the many bakes donated by our students. Unfortunately, due to the weather our planned fun run had to be cancelled, but hopefully later in the year, this will be something that we can do to raise even more money. Despite this, the SU managed to raise a whopping £260.23 for this brilliant cause. Thank you to everyone who donated to both of these charities.
